With the clocks springing ahead on March 12th, we are eagerly anticipating the fun outdoor activities that accompany spring time in North Carolina! At RTP, we too are planning ahead. To start, we have a team working on a few playground enhancements that we are sure the children are going to love exploring. Secondly, several of our classes are gearing up to begin *GardenWorks*.

What is GardenWorks?

GardenWorks primarily grows out of two curricular elements of The World at Their Fingertips: Science Rocks and Well Aware. Science learning opportunities abound within gardening projects. Children learn about the cycle of life, what it takes to nurture a plant and so much more. Similarly, health and wellness learning is embedded throughout GardenWorks as children sample new vegetables they have never tried before and learn how healthy foods nourish the body. GardenWorks also touches on many of the concepts which are part of Toward a Better World which includes a focus on making the world a more sustainable place. Gardening can be a great interactive and learning experience for children of all ages, from infants through school age, either as an activity for one day, a week-long project, or an ongoing project throughout the year.

Building Responsibility

When asked what traits parents would like to see in their children, one of the most common responses is "to be responsible." According to the Center for Parenting Education, being responsible is a key to children's future success both in school and in the larger world.

Contributing to the family by helping with age-appropriate chores instills a sense of responsibility and fosters competence in young children while teaching them valuable life skills. By making helping part of your family culture, you demonstrate that contributions, big and small, are part of the expectations of life. Taking the attitude that "in our family everyone helps" is much more effective than "this is a job that you must do."

With young children, the goal is for the contribution to be enjoyable so it instills a sense of pride. Include your child in the process of planning and assigning jobs. Choose jobs that are appropriate for your child's developmental capacity and temperament. Below are some suggestions:

Toddlers:

- Help put toys away
- Sort and match socks
- Carry own backpack or lunchbox
- Classify items to recycle (cans, paper)
- Turn off lights and the water faucet

2-3 Year Olds:

- Help feed pets
- Dust with socks on hands
- Clear own dishes from table
- Help set the table and fold napkins
- Carry laundry to the washer

4-5 Year Olds:

- Water plants
- Set and clear the table
- Carry out recycling bins
- Make own bed (if simple)
- Rake leaves

Family members develop a closer connection to each other by working side-by-side to complete a task. Every family is unique, yet in all families, it takes cooperation to run a household. Children's contributions help them recognize their competence and the importance of their role in the family. When everyone pitches in, tasks get done more quickly.
